#### **Leinster Strikes the Double!**



Leinster regained the Inter-Provincial Championship once again for the 22<sup>nd</sup> time at Athlone, Co Westmeath. Leinster beat Munster in the 1<sup>st</sup> semi-final through goals from Patrick Maher (2), Damien McMahon and Derek Jordan. Ulster cruised in the 2<sup>nd</sup> semi-final against understrength Connaught. Then it was a classic final between Leinster and Ulster. Ulster led at half time but Leinster came back with a thrilling 3-1 victory. Patrick Maher, Eamonn Byrne and a half-volley cracker from Ross Byrne ensured the cup goes to Leinster. Ross Byrne was the player of the match with Ulster's Danny O'Dea awarded as young player of the match. Leinster's basketball dominance prevailed by winning for the 9<sup>th</sup> time.

It was a great weekend event, not only for Deaf Sports Ireland (DSI) or Leinster Deaf Sports Council (LDSC) but also for Deaf sports in general. Athlone Mayor Jim Henson who presented the cup remarked the phenomenal of this continuing championship after 40 years, which is rare nowadays. It is important that this continue for many years to come. Provided the championship continues for the next 10 years, LDSC would have the honour of hosting the 50<sup>th</sup> championship under the current province rotation.

#### **Superlative Deaflympics**



Over the summer we have seen successes of Irish sports in London Olympics and Paralympics, which are welcome for Irish sports in general. Then we have our own Deaflympics, which is largely undervalued outside the Deaf community. Deaflympics has been in existence since 1924, long before the first Paralympics in 1960. Through DSI, Ireland has been represented at every Deaflympics since 1973..

Deaflympics is recognised as an entity at its own rights by the International Olympics Committee. It is now high time for Irish government and media to take the note of this and recognise Deaf sports. Fortunately, Irish Sports Council has been supporting DSI but further investments are required not only to secure DSI but also enhance Irish participation in the future of Deaflympics.
